A Message From Kate Mattice

Metrorail turns 50 years old this year and it's time to celebrate half a century. The nation's second-busiest mass transit system has carried millions of people since the first trains started operating on March 27, 1976 and NVTC has been intertwined with Metro's history from the beginning. Work to plan the Metro system began soon after NVTC's founding in 1964 with endorsement of a proposed rail rapid transit line, the creation

of the Washington Metropolitan Area Transportation Authority formal planning work and the preservation of right-of-way for future Metrorail.

NVTC helped guide the planning for Metro in Virginia—from appointing members to the Metro Board of Directors to coordinating the locations of stations and their design to creating a financial plan to complete the planned system.

Northern Virginia is home to 32 of the system's 98 stations, including the newest stations on the Silver Line and at Potomac Yard. Each line and station was the result of years of work and collaboration across NVTC's jurisdictions and the Greater Washington region. Metro has also become the backbone of the larger transit network, with local and commuter buses and Virginia Railway Express trains making important connections to Metro stations, allowing travelers to reach a nearly infinite number of destinations.

The work continues to this day, through NVTC's close coordination with Virginia's Metro Board appointees, distribution of state and regional funding for Metro and oversight of Metro funding and policy.

Metro has transformed Northern Virginia's landscape as people sought to live and work near stations. The system has fueled the region's economic boom and generated tax revenues that benefit the entire Commonwealth of Virginia. Metro and the larger transit network have also combatted the growth in traffic congestion and helped avoid harmful pollution. It's hard to imagine what Northern Virginia would look like without Metro and I know that it will be a critical part of life in the region for the next 50 years.

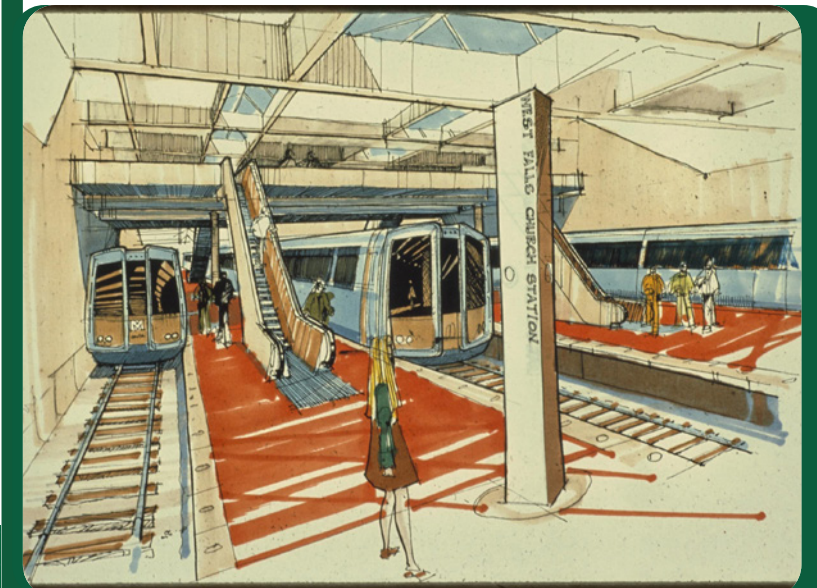

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Commission thanks Sen. Ebbin, welcomes new DRPT and VRE leadership

The Commission lauded former Sen. Adam Ebbin for his 18 years of service to NVTC during its monthly [meeting](#) in March. Ebbin first served as an appointee from the House from 2004 to 2012 and returned as a member of the Senate from 2016 until February.

A resolution noted that he "worked tirelessly with local, regional and state officials to propose long-term sustainable transit funding that will provide adequate growth to meet current and future operating and capital needs for Metro, Virginia Railway Express (VRE) and Northern Virginia's local bus providers." He also chaired the General Assembly's SJ 28 Growing Needs of Northern Virginia Public Transit Joint Subcommittee. Ebbin resigned from the Senate last month to take a job in the administration of Gov. Abigail Spanberger.

The Commission also thanked former Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) Director Tiffany Robinson and welcomed two new faces, one who is very familiar to our readers. Former NVTC staff member Allan Fye was sworn in as an alternate representing DRPT, and new VRE CEO Katie Choe made her first official appearance at a Commission meeting.

Comment period wraps up for I-66 Commuter Choice projects

The public comment opportunity for [projects under consideration](#) for I-66 Commuter Choice funding ran from March 5 through April 3, with Program Manager Daniel Knickelbein hosting a virtual public meeting on April 2. The 14 applications represent transportation improvements put forward by Arlington, Fairfax and Loudoun Counties, OmniRide and Metro. The proposed projects include enhancements to existing bus service and new bus routes and rail station improvements; all proposed projects

would provide additional travel options for commuters across the I-66 corridor.

The Commuter Choice and communications teams collaborated on a series of English and Spanish language ads on [Facebook](#), [Instagram](#) and [Threads](#) to encourage people to fill out our [survey](#). Our teams also shared posts on [LinkedIn](#) and [X](#). Staff will compile the comments received and share them with Commissioners.

Envision Route 7 team discusses design alternatives, spring outreach plans

The NVTC [Envision Route 7](#) project team hosted members of the Envision Route 7 Project Technical Advisory Committee (PTAC) at NVTC March 10, providing updates on bus lane design alternatives, information on how we'll evaluate those alternatives and a review of the upcoming outreach phase, which is currently scheduled for late spring. Fairfax County staff also provided updates on planned initiatives and projects within the County that will benefit bus service along the Route 7 corridor.



NVTC leads the planning process for Envision Route 7, a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) route designed to connect Alexandria to Tysons along the Route 7 corridor. The PTAC is composed of representatives of partner jurisdictions as well as project delivery partners such as Metro and the Virginia Department of Transportation.

Metrorail celebrates 50th anniversary

Metro celebrated 50 years of Metrorail on March 27, which launched a new era of transportation in the National Capital Region. It all began on March 27, 1976, with the first Metrorail trips carrying customers on the 4.6 miles of Red Line between Rhode Island Avenue and Farragut North.

The system quickly transformed how the region moved. In the decades since, Metro has become the backbone of the region's transportation network, with generations of customers relying on the system.

Over the years, customers have taken more than 7 billion trips on Metrorail and more than 15 billion trips across Metrorail, Metrobus and MetroAccess.

Today, the system has grown into a six-line, 130-mile network with 98 stations. In 2025 alone, Metrorail delivered 147 million trips while playing a central role in the area's economy and daily life.

At its March 26 meeting, the Metro Board recognized the contributions of former Board members and general managers. In addition to current Virginia Board members Walter Alcorn, Darien Flowers and alternate Canek Aguirre, former Virginia Board members Kate Hanley, Mary Hynes, Paul Smedberg and Jeff McKay were among the attendees for the celebration.

Metro Board revises budget

At its March 26 Board [meeting](#), Metro released a revised FY 2027 Operating Budget [proposal](#) reflecting updated revenue and expense assumptions as well as continued regional economic considerations. The revised proposal includes an additional \$14 million in revenues driven by fare compliance, uptake of Tap.Ride.Go. and a new fee for [Abilities-Ride](#). Metro identified opportunities to lower operating costs and jurisdictional subsidies in the revised budget by deferring some bus and rail service improvements and initiating a \$3 per trip Abilities-Ride fee. The FY 2027 Operating Budget and FY 2027-2032 Capital Improve-

ment Program are expected to be approved in April.

The Board also reviewed the findings of an operational analysis funded by the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation. This analysis examined opportunities for Metro to realize greater cost efficiencies and enhance self-generated revenue. Consultants from Guidehouse presented 30 opportunities and a series of recommended action items including assessments of Metro's workforce and digital capabilities.

TSDAC discusses potential changes to MERIT formula

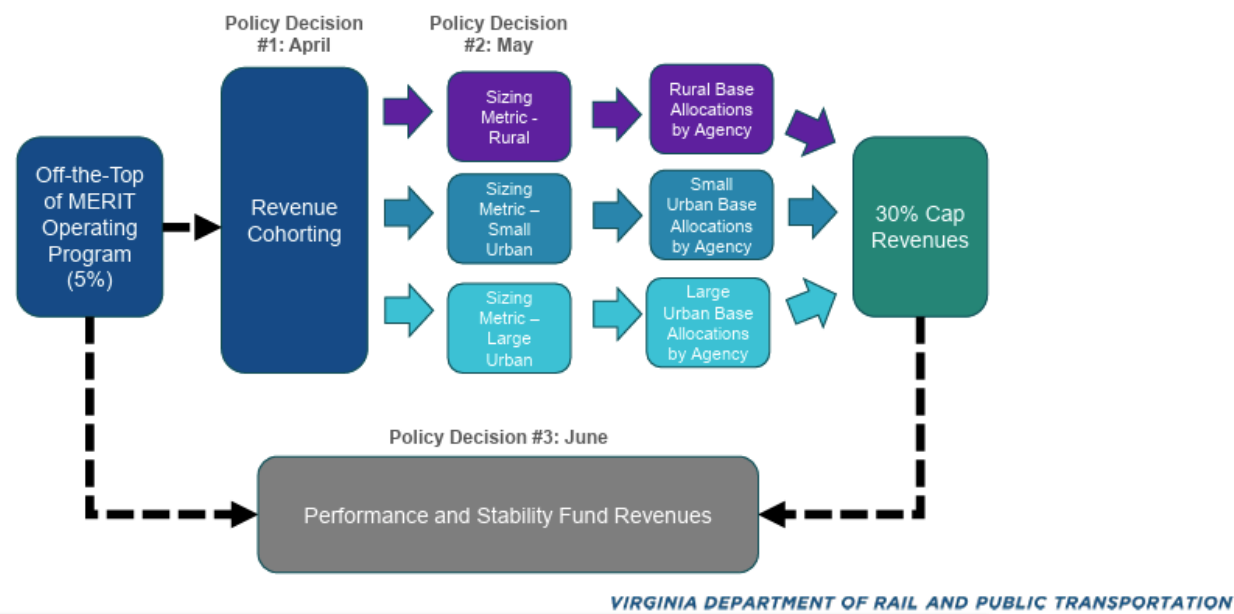
Executive Director Kate Mattice participated in a [meeting](#) of the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee (TSDAC) in Richmond March 10 to continue discussion of potential updates to the [MERIT](#) transit funding formula. DRPT staff provided an [overview](#) of the ongoing MERIT review process and discussed several potential changes aimed at improving the program's transparency and predictability. Much of the discussion focused on the concept of introducing "cohorts" for transit agencies within the operating assistance formula. Under this approach, transit systems could be grouped by characteristics such as agency size or service type so that agencies compete for funding with

more comparable peers rather than under a single statewide formula. TSDAC discussions will continue through the spring as DRPT staff refine the proposal and gather additional feedback before bringing recommendations to the Commonwealth Transportation Board later this year.

Later that week, NVTC hosted a call with transit agency staff from across Northern Virginia to gather feedback on the cohort concept and other elements of the MERIT review. Input from these discussions will help inform Kate's engagement in upcoming TSDAC meetings as the proposal continues to develop.

CTB reviews transit funding needs, Virginia's funding mechanisms

The Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) met in Richmond March 17 and 18, where members received a [series of briefings](#) centered on DMVMoves, the General Assembly's SJ 28 Growing Needs of Northern Virginia Public Transit Joint Subcommittee and long-term transit funding needs in Northern Virginia, alongside broader overviews of the Commonwealth Transportation Fund and [SMART SCALE](#). Discussion emphasized the scale and complexity of the region's transit funding challenge, including continued focus on Metro cost containment measures, as the state continues to evaluate long-term funding

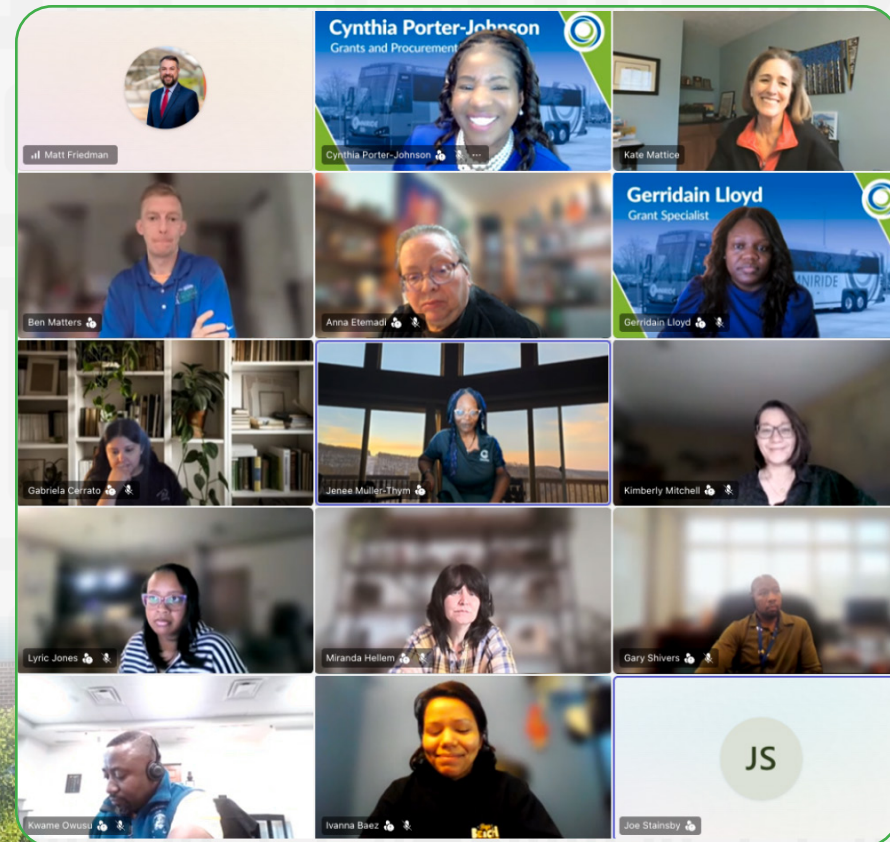
and policy options identified by the joint subcommittee.

CTB members also received a legislative and budget update, where Deputy Transportation Secretary Carter Hutchinson outlined key elements of the House and Senate budget proposals, which take differing approaches to transit funding and support. Spanberger administration officials noted that discussions on long-term transit funding remain ongoing, with additional consideration expected as the budget process continues.

Bus service on Columbia Pike

NoVa's Busiest Bus Corridor

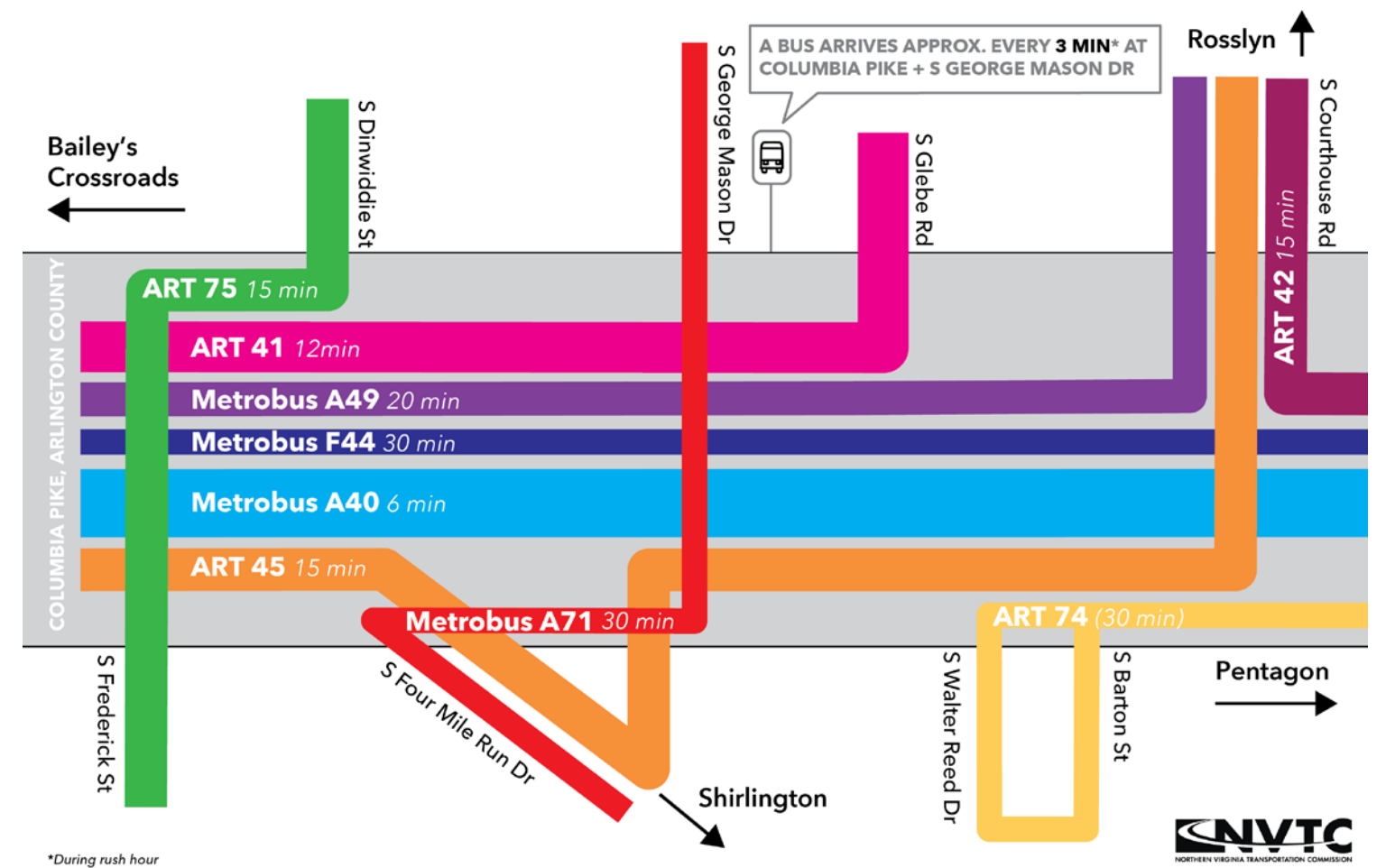
Tracking Service Frequency on Columbia Pike
