A Message From Kate Mattice

Welcome to the new year! We expect 2026 to be a critical year for Northern Virginia transit as we engage with a potentially game-changing Virginia General Assembly Session and reach important milestones in our programs and projects.

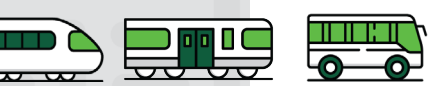
Starting out, we expect funding recommendations from DMVMoves and the General Assembly's SJ 28 Northern Virginia Growing Needs of Public Transit Joint Subcommittee to guide new legislation in the General Assembly Session. The recommendations, if enacted into law, have the potential to provide long-term financial stability for our regional transit network, which experienced record-breaking ridership last year.

2026 will also be an important year for Commuter Choice, which will complete a needs assessment that will shape transit and transportation along I-66, adopt another round of programming along that corridor and issue its next call for projects for I-395/95. The Envision Route 7 project, which completed a planning and outreach push in the fall, will go out to the community again to update riders on project progress between Seven Corners and Southern Towers/Mark Center and gather additional input.

NVTC will also focus on zero-emission bus technical assistance through the NVTC Zero-Emission Bus (ZEB) Working Group, tell the story of Northern Virginia transit through its data visualization and analysis program and continue to manage over \$400 million in funding that supports our local jurisdictions and transit agencies, helping them meet our region's current and future transit needs.

We know we have a lot of work to complete in this new year, but I also know that NVTC leadership and staff are ready to take on these challenges to keep Northern Virginia moving in 2026.

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Legislative Forum looks ahead to long-term transit funding

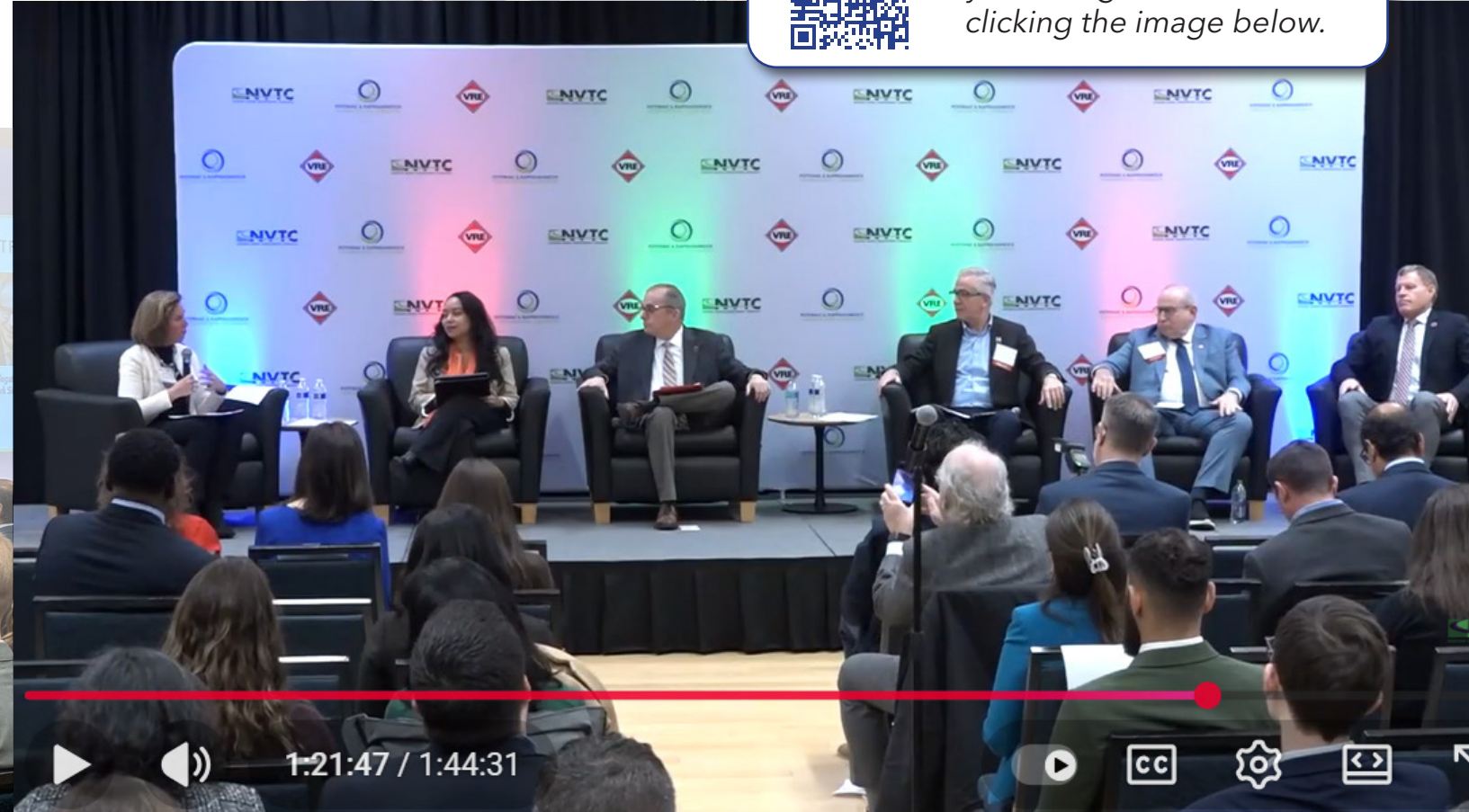
Over 200 people attended NVTC's Legislative Forum in December. The 10th anniversary edition of the Legislative Forum, held jointly with the Potomac and Rappahannock Transportation Commission (PRTC) and Virginia Railway Express (VRE), explored the challenges and opportunities facing the transit agencies that serve the region. It also reviewed the work done by DMVMoves and the General Assembly's SJ 28 Growing Needs of Northern Virginia Public Transit Joint Subcommittee in preparation for the 2026 General Assembly Session.

Attendees heard a lively discussion from leaders at ART, Metro, OmniRide and VRE, elected officials, appointees and community leaders. NVTC's [Legislative Agenda](#) is integral to the Legislative Forum. The 2026 Legislative Agenda reflects a drive toward long-term sustainable funding that supports Northern Virginia's transit needs. It also calls for funding to provide adequate growth to meet current operating and capital needs for Metro, VRE and local bus providers.

The Legislative Forum was the result of months of planning by NVTC staff. Thank you to Tenley O'Hara and Genoveva Cutrell for their leadership in producing this fantastic event.

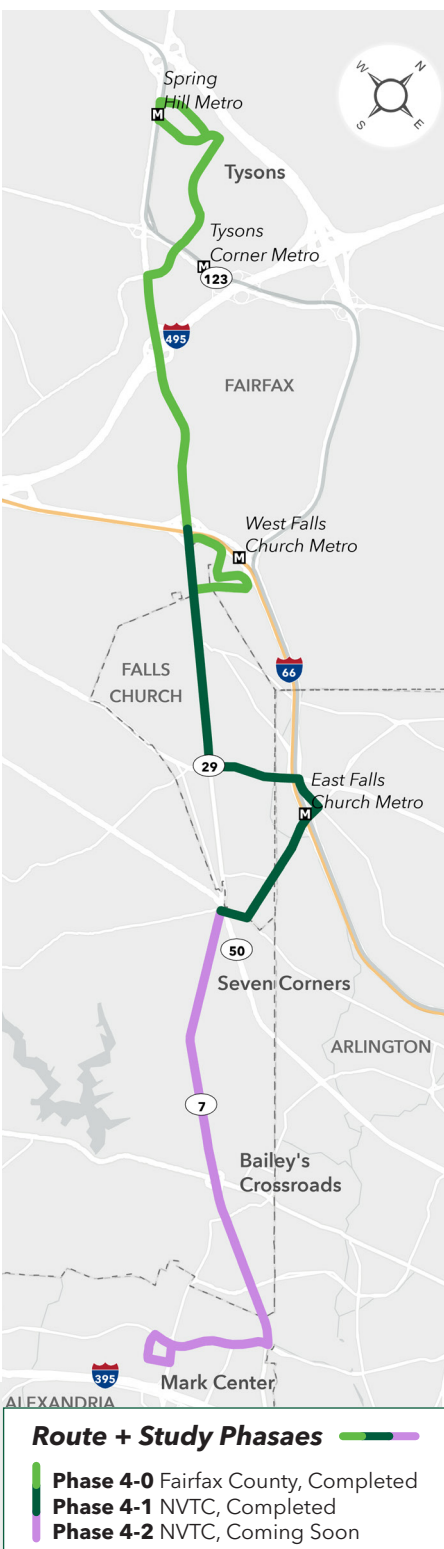


Envision Route 7 team briefs partners on latest milestones

NVTC staff, led by Senior Program Manager Vikram Sinha, and the consultant team briefed members of the [Envision Route 7](#) Project Technical Advisory Committee (PTAC) on the latest updates, including data on the successful fall outreach efforts, updates on the contract and its sub-tasks as well as next steps.

Envision Route 7 is a proposed bus rapid transit (BRT) system connecting Tysons and Alexandria. The current study phase aims to both identify issues related to traffic congestion and examine infrastructure improvements that will help buses move more easily through the corridor.

The PTAC is composed of representatives of partner jurisdictions as well as project delivery partners such as Metro and the Virginia Department of Transportation. City of Falls Church staff also provided updates on projects within the city that will benefit existing bus service. NVTC staff look forward to briefing NVTC Commissioners on the details of outreach at the Program Advisory Committee meeting in February.



New Commuter Choice funded Metrobus route starts service

Two Commuter Choice funded Metrobus routes began new or enhanced service in mid-December. [Route A29](#) launched, connecting the Van Dorn Street Metro Station, West Alexandria Transit Center, Mark Center and Shirlington with Metro Center. Additionally, Metro enhanced service on [Route A25](#), which operates between the Landmark Transit Center and the Pentagon. It now runs every 15 minutes during rush hour, thanks to Commuter Choice. Both routes were funded through the I-395/95 Commuter Choice FY 2026-2027 Program of Projects.



I-66 Call for Projects closes, with up to \$100 million available

The I-66 [Commuter Choice](#) FY 2027-2028 Call for Projects closed December 12, with up to \$100 million in funding available for projects that improve mobility, support new travel options, enhance safety and reliability, and move more people along the I-66 corridor. In January, all applications will undergo an eligibility review to ensure proposed projects provide the requisite

benefits to toll payers, with applications deemed eligible for Commuter Choice funding carried forward to the evaluation and scoring process detailed in the Commuter Choice [Handbook](#). NVTC will open a public comment period in March, providing an opportunity for members of the public to give feedback on the projects under consideration for funding.



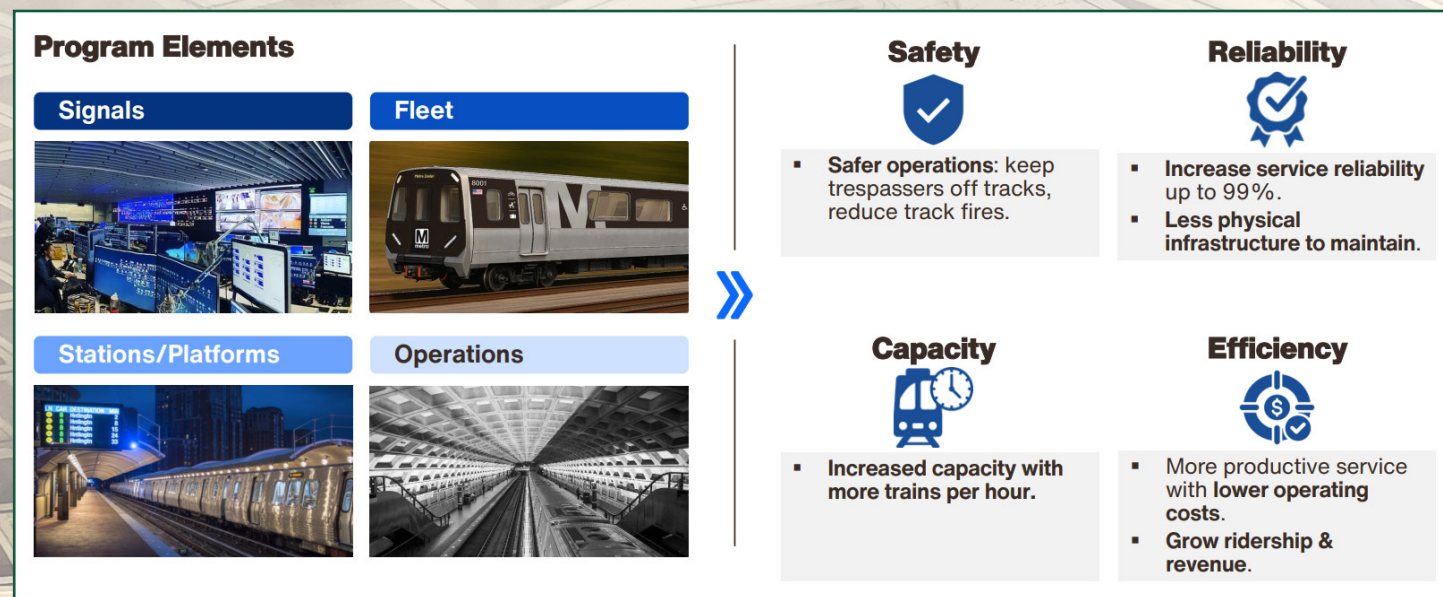
Metro Board reviews FY 2027 proposed budget, rail modernization plans

The Metro Board authorized public hearings for the [FY 2027 Operating Budget and FY 2027-2032 Capital Improvement Program](#) at its [meeting](#) on December 11. The proposed budget focuses on service improvements to further increase ridership and revenue, cost control and less dependence on capital funding for preventive maintenance. Metro will obtain feedback with an online survey and public hearings, and the proposed budget and CIP will be approved by the Board in March or April of next year.

The Board also received a briefing on the vision for modernizing and automating the Metrorail system through the [Rail Modernization](#)

[Program](#). Staff presented a summary of the elements of the program and how they build upon each other as well as the business case for modernization, showing how the potential benefits to Metro and the region could exceed the costs of the program.

Members of the Board also approved submittal of applications for NVTC Commuter Choice grants to bring new limited stop bus service to Northern Virginia beginning as soon as December 2026. Additionally, the Board approved an updated Strategic Transformation Plan and authorized a new public sector employee pass product.



CTB updated on MERIT changes, affirms timeline for additional evaluation

The Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) received an [update](#) from Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) staff December 9 on the ongoing review of the [MERIT](#) operating and capital assistance formulas, including proposed changes designed to simplify the program and strengthen its performance-based structure. DRPT also shared that a request for proposals has been issued, seeking to expand statewide data collection to inform future refinements to the formulas.

The CTB received a resolution from the Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee (TSDAC) recommending that the CTB take action on any formula changes no later than June 30, 2026, so that operating and capital revisions can be reviewed as a unified package. In the weeks leading up to TSDAC's November meeting, numerous transit providers and the Virginia Transit Association requested additional time to evaluate the proposals to better understand their impact.

The CTB ultimately supported this approach and is expected to continue discussions in early 2026, while DRPT conducts further analysis and engagement with transit agencies. NVTC will continue to follow the process closely and keep jurisdictions informed as DRPT and the CTB move toward formal consideration of MERIT updates in the new year.

Proposed Operating Assistance Formula Adjustments / Improvements

- Rebalance the sizing metrics:
 - 35% Operating Cost (proxy for service type + cost of living + service-area size)
 - 35% Ridership
 - 15% Vehicle Revenue Hours
 - 15% Vehicle Revenue Miles
- Establish a **dedicated Performance Set-Aside** using single-year absolute performance ratios:
 - 50% Passengers per Cost
 - 25% Passengers per Vehicle Revenue Hour
 - 25% Passengers per Vehicle Revenue Mile
- Eliminate trend-based calculations to create a **simpler, more transparent** method.
- Limit redistribution cycles so that performance is **not diminished** after agencies hit the 30% cap.
