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FORECAST CODE ORANGE AND CODE RED BAD AIR DAYS MEAN <u>FREE RIDES</u> ON ALL NORTHERN VIRGINIA BUS ROUTES

NVTC LAUNCHES NEW OUTREACH EFFORT TO INFORM NORTHERN VIRGINIANS ABOUT AIR QUALITY AND PROMOTE BUS RIDERSHIP

Arlington, VA — On May 1, 2007 the American Lung Association released its annual State of the Air report which ranks the Washington-Baltimore-Northern Virginia metro area 20th on its list of most polluted cities in America.

To address the regions critical air quality needs the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) is launching a new outreach effort:

"Ride Free Northern Virginia
Be Part of the Solution, Reduce Ozone Pollution"



Starting May 1st through September 15th, 2007, on <u>forecast</u> Code Orange and Code Red days, Northern Virginia bus systems will provide free rides to commuters to lure people out of their cars and onto mass transit.

Poor air quality affects everyone and Air Quality Action Days require that Northern Virginians make small adjustments to their normal routines in order to minimize impacts on the environment.

What is a 'Bad Air Day' and how does it affect the health of people and the environment?

A forecast Code Orange or Red Air Quality Action Day or "Bad Air" Day means that ozone levels are predicted to be extremely high and the air quality very poor. By getting more commuters to take the bus, instead of driving their cars, the NVTC hopes to limit the levels of Nitrogen Oxides (NOx) and other toxic emissions and to meet the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) air quality standards.

According to the American Lung Association, ozone acts as a powerful respiratory irritant at the levels frequently found here during summer months. Ozone exposure may lead to:

- shortness of breath;
- chest pain when inhaling deeply; and
- wheezing and coughing.

Long-term, repeated exposure to high levels of ozone may lead to reductions in lung function, inflammation of the lung lining and increased respiratory discomfort. The EPA estimates that 5 to 20 percent of the total U.S. population is especially susceptible to the harmful effects of ozone air pollution.

In addition to health risks, the cars we drive emit carbon dioxide, the gas which is primarily responsible for global warming. The emissions from burning fossil fuels can remain in the atmosphere for decades or even centuries -- creating what scientists call global warming. Global warming heats the surface of the earth and leads to increased health risks as well as increasingly severe weather -- like hurricanes and tropical storms.

How to 'Ride Free'

During the summer months, area residents should tune into their local radio or television stations to hear the air quality forecast for the following day. If the next day is forecast as a Code Orange or Red day, they RIDE FREE on Northern Virginia's buses. There is no other action required by commuters to participate. The 'Ride Free NoVA' Outreach Campaign & On-Board Survey

In an effort to reach as many area commuters as possible, NVTC has created a special web site, partnered with 2,000 employers, mailed over 10,000 brochures, distributed 500 posters and will advertise on the exterior of 50 buses in Northern Virginia.

The web site and brochure provide area residents with tips on how they can reduce air pollution, explain how to plan a trip and take the bus, and give a brief overview of regional air quality.

In addition to the outreach campaign, NVTC will measure awareness of the program and survey passengers on various bus routes to determine whether the 'Ride Free NoVA' program is effective.
