State Board Approves \$3.8 Million Program of Projects to Improve Commutes on the I-66 Corridor

Low-cost, low-risk projects adapt to changes in commuting

Arlington, VA - The Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) voted Wednesday and authorized the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission (NVTC) to use toll revenues from the 66 Express Lanes to fund <u>six low-cost</u>, <u>low-risk transit and multimodal projects</u> in Northern Virginia. "Thanks to the support of the CTB, we're growing the Commuter Choice program, despite the challenges of the COVID-19 public health emergency," said NVTC Executive Director Kate Mattice. "We're expanding the transportation network now using a conservative strategy focused on low-cost projects and longstanding assets to ensure access to convenient, safe and reliable choices whenever people are ready to commute."

The competitive grant application process resulted in a group of projects that will improve access to the McLean Metrorail Station, continue service for three existing, high-performing express bus services and allow buses to travel more quickly along Lee Highway in Arlington. Due to the steep decline in toll revenues from the 66 Express Lanes, a funding source for the Commuter Choice program, staff proposed a moderate approach to support a single year of the two-year program, providing continuity for some projects while adding long-term capital infrastructure. NVTC continues to work closely with the Commonwealth of Virginia to monitor trends in toll revenues and expects to identify the full availability of funds for the remaining projects under consideration next spring.

NVTC previously funded 36 projects, investing over \$60 million into multimodal improvements in both the I-66 and I-395 corridors, as highlighted in the <u>2020 annual report</u>. Commuter Choice, a partnership between the Commonwealth of Virginia and NVTC, makes the Northern Virginia transportation network better by investing toll revenues into public transit and other multimodal projects along two expressway corridors, I-66 and I-395/95. The projects funded through Commuter Choice move more people, support

the regional economy, increase mobility options and reduce congestion and emissions.
