## APPOINTMENT OF COMMISSION MEMBERS:

Chapters 630 and 631, Acts of Assembly 1964, became effective I July 1964. Very soon thereafter, the participating counties and cities appointed their representatives to the Commission: Messrs. Joseph Alexander, Frederick A. Babson, John L. Beerman, and John P. Parrish from Fairfax County; Messrs. Roye L. Lowry, Thomas W. Richards, and Leo Urbanske, Jr., from Arlington County; Messrs. Nicholas A. Colasanto and James T. Luckett, Jr., from Alexandria City; Mr. Philip D. Fisher from Fairfax City; and Mr. Lee M. Rhoads from Falls Church City. The State Highway Commissioner designated Mr. John P. Mills, Jr., to represent the Virginia Department of Highways. Mr. Richards resigned from the Commission and was replaced in January by Mr. Joseph L. Fisher from Arlington.

### MEETINGS:

The Commission conducted its organizational meeting on 1 September 1964, and regular public meetings on 3 December 1964, 17 December 1964, 14 January 1965, 4 March 1965, and 20 May 1965.

## OFFICERS AND STAFF:

At the organizational meeting, the Commission elected Mr. Babson as Chairman, Mr. Rhoads as Vice Chairman, and Mr. Lowry as Secretary-Treasurer. At the second December meeting, the Commission hired Mr. Gordon J. Thompson, urban transportation planner, as Executive Secretary effective 15 January 1965. Subsequently, Mr. Leo E. Chandler, transit consultant, was hired to assist Mr. Thompson in setting up the Commission's headquarters.

## PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES:

The Commission decided to direct its full attention to gaining Congressional approval of the plans of the National Capital Transportation Agency (NCTA) for a Washington, D. C., subway system. Toward this objective, members of the Commission spoke before neighborhood, business, and technical groups. The Commission offered testimony before Congressional hearings in support of the legislation authorizing construction of the subway. NVTC newsletter was initiated to keep the public informed of the NCTA plan and its benefits to Northern Virginians; five issues were published during February to June of 1965.

Due to an untimely application of the Washington &Old Dominion Railroad to abandon its entire line between Alexandria and Purcellville, the Commission diverted much of its resources to seek to preserve the railroad for rapid transituse by opposing abandonment before the Virginia State Corporation Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The Commission assisted the Joint Transportation Commission in circulating the proposed interstate compact legislation among county board and city council members of Northern Virginia jurisdictions for review and comments before it was passed by the Maryland Assembly. Maryland approved the compact in March.

The Commission also assisted in the establishment of a National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board in compliance with a Congressional mandate that a continuous, cooperative, comprehensive transportation planning process be in effect prior to 30 June 1965 in order for metropolitan areas to continue to be eligible for Federal assistance in financing highways.

At its May meeting, the Commission adopted a budget and program for the fiscal year beginning 1 July 1965. The \$162,200 budget will finance a program of transit planning with the objective of completing suburban rapid transit extensions into Virginia at the same time that NCTA completes the subway from downtown to the Pentagon.
